**Dinesh D’Souza** is the Robert and Karen Rishwain Fellow at the Hoover Institution at Stanford University. *Investor’s Business Daily* called him one of the “top young public-policy makers in the country,” and the *New York Times* magazine named him one of America’s most influential conservative thinkers. Before joining the Hoover Institution, Mr. D’Souza was the John M. Olin Fellow at the American Enterprise Institute. In 1987–88 he served as senior policy analyst at the Reagan White House. He graduated Phi Beta Kappa from Dartmouth College in 1983. Mr. D’Souza’s books include the *New York Times* bestseller *What’s So Great About America*. His 1991 book *Illiberal Education* was the first study to publicize the phenomenon of political correctness. His latest book is titled *What’s So Great About Christianity?* D’Souza has debated atheist Christopher Hitchens on several occasions.

**Peter Singer** is the Ira W. DeCamp Professor of Bioethics at the University Center for Human Values at Princeton University, a position he has held since 1999. He was educated at the University of Melbourne and the University of Oxford and has taught at the University of Oxford, La Trobe University and Monash University. Singer was the founding President of the International Association of Bioethics and, with Helga Kuhse, founding co-editor of the journal *Bioethics*. Singer first became internationally known after the publication of *Animal Liberation* in 1975. His other books include *Practical Ethics*, *How Are We to Live?*, *Rethinking Life and Death*, *One World*, *The President of Good and Evil*, and his latest work, *The Way We Eat: Why Our Food Choices Matter*.
